**RESPECT LIFE**

**United States Conference of Catholic Bishops**

**URGENT: Stop Abortion Funding in Health Care Reform! Protect Conscience. Ensure Affordable Health Coverage. Allow Immigrants to Purchase Private Health Insurance.**

As long-time advocates of health care reform, the U.S. Catholic bishops continue to make the moral case that genuine health care reform must protect the life, dignity, consciences and health of all, especially the poor and vulnerable. Health care reform should not advance a pro-abortion agenda in our country.

\*On November 7, the U.S. House of Representatives passed major health care reform that reaffirms the essential, longstanding and widely supported policy against using federal funds for elective abortions and includes positive measures on affordability and immigrants.

\*On December 24, the U.S. Senate rejected this policy and passed health care reform that requires federal funds to help subsidize and promote health plans that cover elective abortions. All purchasers of such plans will be required to pay for other people’s abortions through a separate payment solely to pay for abortion.

\*Outside the abortion context, neither bill has adequate conscience protection for health care providers, plans or employers.

\*These two bills must now be combined into one bill that both the House and Senate will vote on in final form. Provisions against abortion funding and in favor of conscience protection, affordability, and immigrants’ access to health care must be part of a fair and just health care reform bill, or the final bill must be opposed.

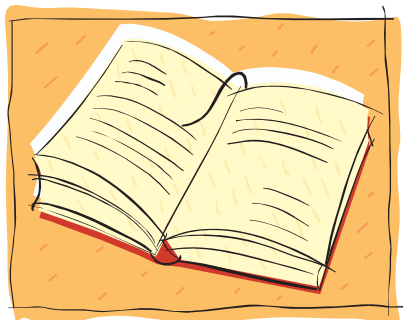

**GRATITUDE .... REALIZATION THAT "IT'S ALL HIS ANYWAY"**  
"It's silly to think in terms of what we can give to God"



*I think every one who has some vague belief in God, until he becomes a Christian, has the idea of an exam or of a bargain in mind. The first result of real Christianity is to blow that idea into bits. When they find it blown to bits, some people think this means that Christianity is a failure and give up. They seem to imagine that God is very simple-minded. In fact, of course, He knows all about this. One of the very things Christianity was designed to do was to blow this idea to bits. God has been waiting for the moment at which you discover that there is no question of earning a passing mark in this exam or putting Him in your debt.*

*Then comes another discovery. Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already. So that when we talk of a man doing anything for God or giving anything to God, I will tell you what it is really like. It is like a small child going to his father and saying, "Daddy, give me sixpence to buy you a birthday present." Of course, the father does, and he is pleased with the child's present. It is all very nice and proper, but only an idiot would think that the father is sixpence to the good in the transaction.*

C. S. Lewis, *Mere Christianity*

**"It's ALL His anyway ... even me."** ... In his book, "Mere Christianity," C. S. Lewis describes the core belief in the life of a Christian Steward. It's the freeing, yet initially uncomfortable, realization that **"It's ALL His anyway ... even me."** When we discover this reality, we learn that the life of a Christian Steward involves using God's gifts to live God's purpose for our lives. It's uncomfortable because it goes against the grain of the culture that surrounds us. It's freeing because it affirms that we are all children of God and He loves us all just as we are, just as He created us.

The world around us preaches survival of the fittest and the self-sufficiency of our efforts. In this view of the world, the competition to be number one is based on whatever standard the world values at the moment. Winning this man-made competition is our purpose for living. Since we set the rules of the competition and the definition of success, we are the center of this man-made universe. In this world, we can easily fall prey to the belief that we are the sole source of our success. And we might actually come to believe that we can give something to God that He needs from us. It's a world in which we can find ourselves attempting to get a passing grade or put God in our debt because of what we have done for Him.

This worldview is counter to the reality. Its basic premise of man's self-sufficiency is seriously flawed. It denies the source of the gift of time that allows us to live. It denies the source of the talents or skills that allow us to succeed. It denies the fact that whatever wealth we amass or success we experience is the direct result of the application of our God-given talents within God's gift of life (time).

**The Choice** ... If we are merely a random mixture of talents and truly self-sufficient, then "whoever dies with the most toys" is a valid path. If we are merely a random mixture of talents and truly self-sufficient, then any gratuity that we care to leave for God can be applied to a passing grade. If it's large enough, it might even be sufficient to put God in our debt.

On the other hand, if we are uniquely created by God and endowed with the time, talents and treasure to fulfill His unique role for each of us, then how we manage these God-given gifts is paramount. One thing is certain ... it's silly to think in terms of what we can give to God. We can't give Him anything that He doesn't already have in abundance. It's ALL His ... even me. But, just like the father in Lewis' analogy, Our Father is pleased with the gratitude lovingly returned from the time, talent and treasure loaned to us.

**BUILDING BLESSED SACRAMENT SCHOOL'S "TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE"**  
Part One of the Snap-Shot History of our School from the Ground Up

Over the years, Blessed Sacrament School has been blessed through the dedication, hard work and stewardship of many generations of parish and school families. The following is Part One of the snap-shot view of the history of the school campus from the ground up. Hopefully, you will accept the invitation to attend the school open house during Catholic School's Week to see first-hand what has been accomplished.

**September, 1948** ... Blessed Sacrament School opened in September, 1948 consisting of Kindergarten and grades 1& 2. Two sisters (Sister Carina and Sister Theophane) commuted from St. Patrick's Convent on Rutledge Avenue to staff the school along with Mrs. Swistak for the Kindergarten. Enrollment was 108 students.

Construction of a permanent school building was begun early in 1948 to accommodate the growing needs of Blessed Sacrament parish. The building was designed to have two classrooms and a spacious assembly hall which could be divided into two more classrooms as the parish needs required. Total cost of the building was \$33,396.



**June 15, 1952** ... On June 15, 1952, ground was broken for a new Blessed Sacrament School building by His Excellency John J. Russell. This is the main building facing Savannah Highway. The completion of this building in 1953 added five (5) new classrooms, an assembly room, kitchenette, and convent. Total cost was \$162,000.

On September 4, 1953, the main school building and convent was dedicated by Bishop Russell. Sixth grade was added. The school now had grades 1 thru 6 comprised of 8 groups plus Kindergarten. Total enrollment was 471 students.



**Fall 1953 - Spring 1954** ... When additional school space was required, the parishioners of Blessed Sacrament provided the "strong backs and full hearts" to erect the needed annex building on a 100% voluntary basis. The annex duplicated the first annex building and provided four (4) classrooms, restrooms, and a serving kitchen.

*As reported in the News and Courier (February 2, 1954), "A monument is being built west of the Ashley. Literally, it's a school going up, an annex to the School of the Blessed Sacrament Roman Catholic Church. But its story is such to make it a monument to the strong backs and full hearts of the approximately 30 builders. .... 'The men just show up', Fr. McCarthy explained. .... 'it's based on two factors - love of children and the bigness of men's hearts. .... Because of using volunteer labor, the job will be completed at a third of what it would have cost under contract."*



**January, 1999** ... "Building for the New Millennium Campaign" was launched. Over the years, the complete renovation and modernization of the school were undertaken. This major school program started in the main building (facing Savannah Highway). This wing was completely renovated on the first and second floors including the addition of an elevator for handicap access to the second floor. On the second floor, the work included: a) four classrooms for the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grades; b) a modern science classroom and lab facility; c) office space for a counselor; and, d) a conference room. On the first floor, the work included: a) four classrooms with space available for a fifth; b) expansion of the administrative office and reception areas and a first aide room; c) renovation and expansion of the library; d) addition of storage space; e) relocation of playground; and, f) school landscaping. Total Cost = \$1,416,571.
